The society in which a journalist works bears tremendous influence on his/her ethical approach to the work even in the presence of well-documented code of ethics or recognized regulatory body like the Nigerian Press Council. Identify and explain five (5) ethical traps that required journalists' conscious effort to avoid in Nigeria. (15 Marks)
- 5. The normative theories of the press provide a systemic normative view on the way the media operate in different types of society from authoritarian to libertarian prisms. However, two of the theories, social responsibility and development media theories, have promises for heralding a great community of pluralistic groups and advance development of the society.
